Each of the 57 luxuriously-appointed guest rooms in this world-class retreat carefully blends the Southwest's past with unsurpassed luxury. Soothing, peaceful rooms feature hand-crafted furnishings, four-poster beds, gas-lit kiva fireplaces and vigas and latillas—the wooden beams and poles of traditional Santa Fe architecture. Local artwork adorns the walls and ceramic bowls made by regional artisans offer fresh fruit. Guests feel pampered curled up by a warm fire, enjoying delicious treats left by their bedside each evening.

Santa Fe, sitting in the shadows of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains, has been welcoming visitors for centuries. First founded by Spanish missionaries in 1609, the 'City of Holy Faith' offers something for everyone—outdoor adventures, more than 200 art galleries, an array of outstanding restaurants, exquisite museums and world-renowned cultural events.

The Inn is just steps from the historic plaza—the heart of Santa Fe's cultural district. The 92-seat Anasazi Restaurant is New Mexico's only four-star, four-diamond-rated restaurant. The warm Southwest setting offers elegant world-class dining with just the right touch of local style and comfort. Wood floors and rough-hewn tables are accented with hand-woven Chimayo textiles, wrought-iron sconces and soft adobe-colored walls. The restaurant serves an exceptionally flavorful menu that honors the culinary legends of the Southwest—foods of the earth from the Native American, foods of the soul from the New Mexican and foods of substance from the American cowboy. Chefs use many of the locally grown fruits and vegetables as well as organic meats and poultry to create exciting culinary dishes at this award-winning restaurant. Breakfast, lunch and dinner are served daily and the restaurant features a delightful Sunday brunch. For those desiring an even more

intimate setting, up to 14 guests can dine in the private Wine Cellar where guests will be dazzled with a customized menu and an unforgettable gastronomic experience in a one-of-a-kind ambiance.

The Inn is a delightful place to relax, but just as important, it can be a comfortable setting for even the most important business deals. The Library, a wonderful resource for learning about the area's myths and legends, transforms into a boardroom for corporate meetings or dinners.
